Thanks to the generosity of our donors and their belief in our mission, we raised \$56.8 million in fiscal year 2025.

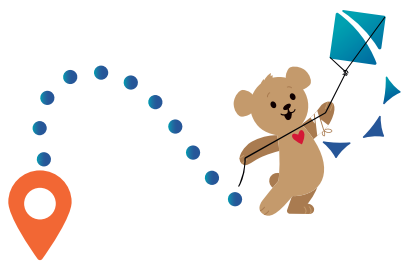

Patient Spotlight: Trent



Trent might not be able to give you the specifics on how Rady Children's Health came to be, but he'll be able to tell you about the expert, compassionate care he received at both hospitals after being diagnosed at 8 years old with a fast-growing malignant brain tumor—a rare cancer with less than a 40% chance of being cured in the first 18 months.

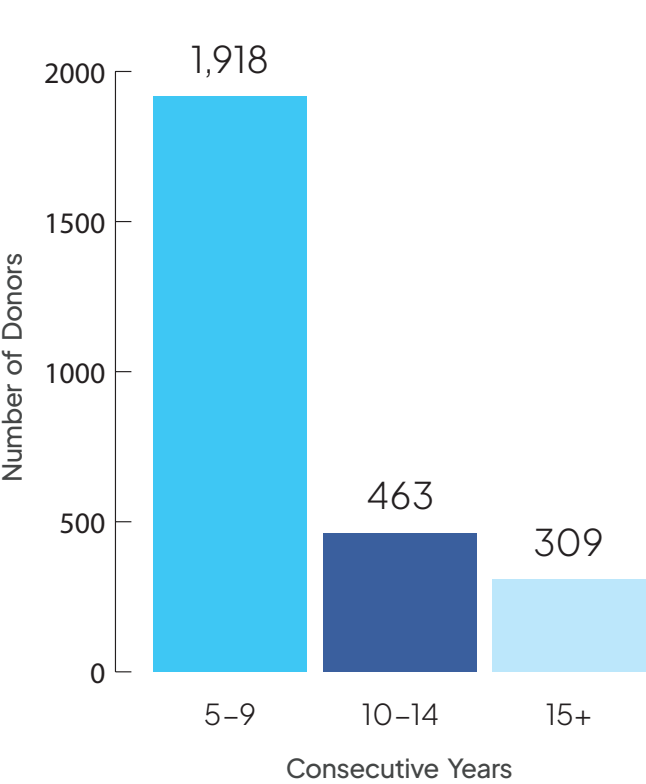

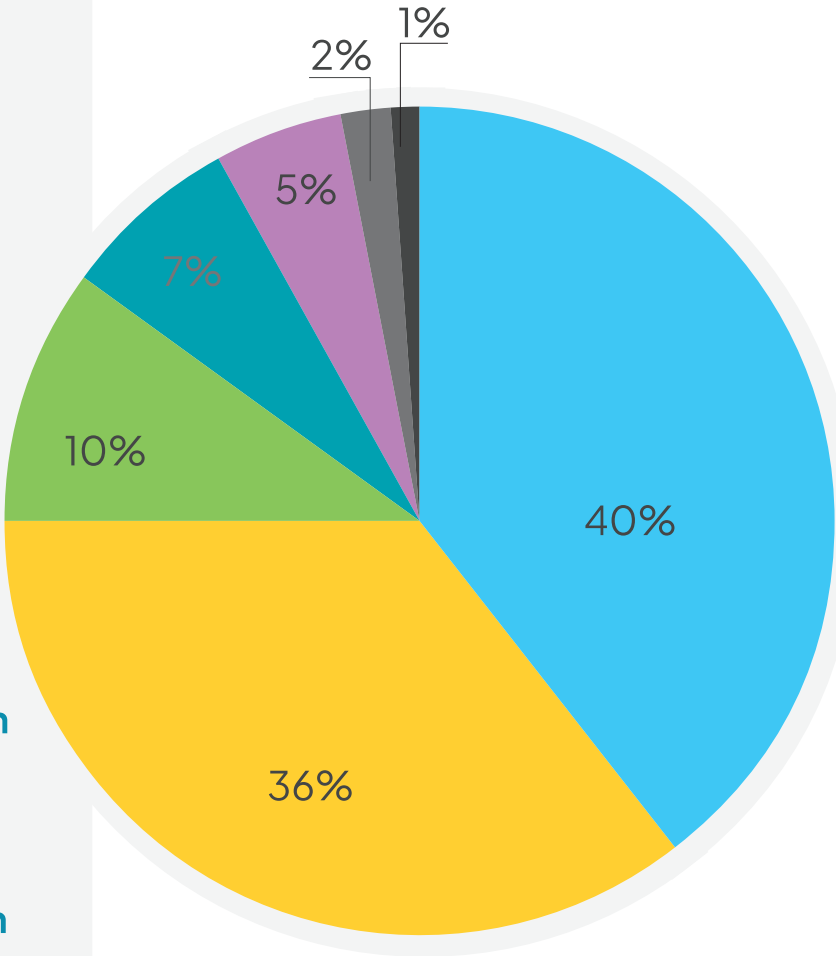

Record-Breaking Support, Lasting Impact

In calendar year 2025, the power of community was on full display. For the first time, all CHOC Foundation signature fundraising events achieved record-breaking results. We are beyond grateful to our dedicated donors, supportive volunteers, and passionate committee members, who all made these events truly impactful. Every mile walked, applause heard, conversation shared, and dollars generously given transform children's lives.



Held at the beautiful Pelican Hill Golf Club® in Newport Beach, the 13th annual CHOC Classic **raised more than \$930,000**, bringing patients and families closer to greener, brighter tomorrows. The CHOC Classic continues to be a premier event for philanthropic-minded golfers, business leaders, community partners, and sponsors for a full day of golf, inspiring stories, and celebration.



More than 1,000 community and philanthropic leaders gathered at the Grove of Anaheim for the 16th annual CHOC Gala, **raising \$6.4 million** in support of Rady Children's Health Orange County's greatest needs. The evening featured moving stories from patients and families, along with a heartfelt mission moment with honorary co-chairs Freddie and Chelsea Freeman. Guests enjoyed a live auction experience and a starlit concert with country music star Blake Shelton and surprise guest Gwen Stefani—creating an unforgettable night for Rady Children's.



Step by step, our amazing CHOC Walk in the Park community gathered at Disneyland® Resort with spirit and heart, **raising more than \$3 million** to help our patients find their way back to the magic of childhood. More than 7,000 participants across over 400 teams celebrated children's health and well-being. From proudly holding "Why I Walk for CHOC" signs to hearing CHOC Walk Ambassador Belle Wuich's inspiring cancer journey, every walker added to the CHOC Walk story that's three decades in the making.



Our third annual Luncheon **raised more than \$1.1 million** to support mental health services and programs at Rady Children's Health Orange County. Emmy Award-winning American Meteorological Society meteorologist and KTLA 5 Morning News sportscaster Henry DiCarlo moderated a powerful interview with Emmy Award-winning choreographer, multi-talented entertainer, and *New York Times* best-selling author Derek Hough on the mental health effects of bullying and digital media.

Patient Spotlight: Dylan



After Dylan's mom, Nicole, was rushed to their local hospital in San Francisco to deliver her first baby at just 24 weeks pregnant, Dylan spent her first four months in the neonatal intensive care unit (NICU). Dependent on feeding tubes and breathing support, she developed severe oral aversion and required a gastrostomy tube (g-tube) for nutrition and hydration.

As Dylan grew, persistent acid reflux and vomiting made feeding even harder.

Despite assembling a team of specialists, Nicole realized, "You don't just need a team—you need the right team."

For Dylan's family, like so many others, that support came from the experts at Rady Children's. Dylan was evaluated by pediatric gastroenterologist Dr. Ashish Chogle and began feeding therapy at Rady Children's Orange campus in January 2025. For two months, Nicole flew back and forth from San Francisco to Orange County. Thrilled by Dylan's progress, the family relocated to Orange County in March.

Today, Dylan is thriving—eating and drinking without her g-tube, even getting to celebrate her first birthday with a smash cake—an achievement her family once thought impossible.

Introducing the Southwest Tower

The nine-story outpatient and research facility in Orange brings together more than 25 specialty clinics, thoughtfully designed care spaces, and cutting-edge technology in a vibrant, family-friendly environment. Launched in August 2025 through the vision of Rady Children's gastroenterology (GI) team and a generous gift from Sherry and John Phelan, the GI Integrative Health and Culinary Medicine Program is helping children with chronic digestive conditions find relief not only through medicine but through mindful eating, targeted nutrition, and hands-on cooking education with dietary specialists.

Expanding Pediatric Neuroscience Care

The new Neuroscience Unit in Orange strengthens our ability to deliver comprehensive, leading-edge care for children with neurological conditions. With support from Kristie and Gabriel Griess, Epilepsy Foundation Greater Orange County, Jenny and Bill Klein, The Walden W. and Jean Young Shaw Foundation, and many generous donors, the unit includes 28 private rooms, featuring a 12-bed epilepsy monitoring unit equipped with advanced EEG (electroencephalography) technology for continuous seizure observation.



Launching a Dedicated Cardiovascular Intensive Care Unit (CVICU)

The 23,600-square-foot unit is the only dedicated pediatric CVICU in Orange County and has doubled to include 24 private patient rooms. Thanks to the generosity of Delphine Lee and Ron Ainsworth, The Edwards Lifesciences Fund, Rob Caulfield, Lietzau Patterns, Inc., The Medtronic Foundation and many other supporters, the increased capacity of our new CVICU will allow us to care for more complex cardiac patients, particularly those requiring surgery and ECMO, a life-saving technology for the sickest patients.



Opening Our First Pediatric-Only Urgent Care in Irvine

The Tsao Family Foundation's generosity and commitment to pediatric excellence have created a space where children can receive trusted after-hours care, seven days a week, 365 days a year. Families in central Orange County now have a nearby, walk-in clinic option for their kids' medical needs without needing to visit the emergency room.

Patient Spotlight: Phillip



At just 11 years old, Phillip's seemingly ordinary summer turned into a life-changing ordeal when what started as leg pain—later spreading to his back—was diagnosed as cancer.

After imaging and a biopsy, Phillip began chemotherapy and subsequently underwent an eight-hour surgery to remove part of his right femur and replace it with a nickel-cobalt prosthetic anchored into his tibia.

The operation also required the removal of a significant amount of muscle, and his recovery involved intensive physical therapy to regain strength and flexibility.

Despite these hardships, Phillip's story took an inspiring turn—he returned to his passion for dance and musical theater. He says the prosthetic actually gave him fluidity, returning movements he once feared he'd lost—and in his latest musical theater audition, he owned the stage.

Now cancer-free, Phillip enjoys singing, dancing, and even hiking challenging trails at places like Mount Rubidoux and Zion National Park. His experience not only marks a medical victory but a return to joy and the chance to dream again.

Patient Spotlight: Max



In July 2025, Max suddenly had a noticeable limp and kept tripping and falling. His mother, Chelsea, took her son to a clinic, where Max's condition continued to worsen, leaving him unable to stand or sit up. He even stopped eating and drinking.

Chelsea took her son to see his pediatrician. After taking Max's vitals, she told Chelsea to go to a pediatric emergency department immediately and called an ambulance.

Chelsea's husband and Max's dad, Los Angeles Dodgers first baseman Freddie Freeman, rushed to get on the first flight back to Southern California from Houston, where his team was playing a series against the Astros.

Chelsea described the next few hours as "the scariest of my life."

While checking in at the Julia and George Argyros Emergency Department at Rady Children's Hospital Orange County, Max's heart stopped.

Doctors and nurses quickly came alongside Max to assess and treat him. Within a few hours, Max couldn't move any part of his body below his neck. Freddie arrived to see his young son hooked up to a ventilator and breathing tube.

"To see one of your kids on a ventilator fighting ... it was hard," Freddie recalls.

The next day, the Freeman family had a diagnosis: Max had Guillain-Barré syndrome, a condition in which the body's immune system attacks its nerves. After receiving two rounds of immunotherapy, Max was able to shrug his shoulders. Within 48 hours of paralysis, Max came off the ventilator—and minutes after that, he was sitting in Freddie's lap.

"I can't tell you how good that felt, to be able to hold my son again," Freddie says.

Max spent eight days in our Josie Y.S. Lee Pediatric Intensive Care Unit before being discharged.

The following day, he started physical therapy to relearn how to do nearly everything.

Max is expected to make a full recovery, thanks in part to the resources made possible through philanthropy, which empower our care teams to respond to emergent, complex and critical needs. Their greatest needs are met through our community's generosity, ensuring that kids can get back to being kids.

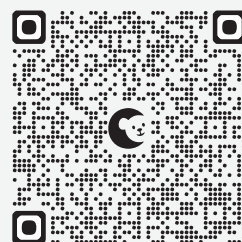
